EDITOR'S NOTES:

This location for Johnson, with Selleck as assistant, was destroyed in the 2 November 1852 fire which consumed much of Sacramento. Johnson subsequently relocated to San Francisco with Selleck as partner. Johnson's association with Selleck would continue until January 1854.
